These were just some of the merchants who cared enough about our neighborhood and our annual Christmas function to donate a door prize. Others wish to remain anonymous - but thank you just the same.



LEGAL AID TIPS

(From Legal Aid of Western Missouri)

It is illegal for landlords to evict tenants on their own. A landlord may not lock a tenant out, shut off utilities or remove a tenant's possessions. In Kansas City an ordinance makes it a misdemeanor for a landlord to lock a tenant out, remove the tenant's personal property, remove doors or shut off or diminish utility services. A landlord must go to court to evict a tenant.

Tenants should call the City Prosecutor at 274-2512 if they are illegally locked out.

Are you renting an apartment and there is no heat in the building? A landlord has a legal obligation to keep the property in a safe, sanitary, and habitable condition. A tenant may not stop paying the rent unless he(she) gives the landlord written notice of the problem, and gives the landlord a chance to repair. Then the tenant should pay the rent into a special bank account.

Tenants living in buildings without proper heat or utilities or in other unsafe or unsanitary conditions should contact an attorney before taking action.



The good citizens of Westport, County Mayo, Ireland, under the auspices of the Westport Urban Council, have invited the people of Westport in Kansas City, Missouri to a "Convention of Westports" to take place the weekend of June 22-23, 1985.

There are thirteen Westports in the U.S.A., as well as a Westport, New Zealand, which are all invited to attend this grand convention.

You do not, however, have to be Irish and you do not have to live in a Westport to be as welcome as the first breath of an Irish spring.

This is not a guided tour, but reservations can be made for you via Aer Lingus to Shannon, Ireland. For those flying from Kansas City, reservations are available to Boston or New York on June 20th. Transportation for you from Shannon to Westport is available by bus or auto.

Passports should be applied for at least two months prior to departure.





AH, THE FIRST SIGNS OF SPRING

You have noticed that the lawns are greening and the flowers are blooming. The weather is lovely, so you open your windows. This is really the first sign of Spring. You can now hear all the sounds that were muffled during the winter because the windows were closed.

We all need to be aware that the sounds and noises we make in our houses and apartments and also in our yards carry into other people's lives and space. It isn't only the loud parties and live bands, but conversations, laughing, shouting, musical instruments, children at play, motorcycles, animals, cars and construction.

Whatever you are doing, ask yourself if you think your neighbors can hear. Since most of the houses are close together on some blocks, it is not too surprising that everyone on the block knows more about each other than they really want to know.

There are ordinances concerning noise - how loud and times of day permitted. No one really enjoys turning their neighbors in for violations, nor do we enjoy being in violation and being turned into the city ourselves.

Objective for this Spring: Let's all be more quiet and considerate of our neighbors.

ATTENTION RESIDENTS

On all the streets in our neighborhood there are children playing and maybe riding bikes. It is your responsibility to look out for the little ones and make this a safe place to live and play.

QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS

.........

A questionnaire was distributed at the last general meeting in March and also appeared in the last newsletter. We received 32 responses and evaluated the results at the last executive board meeting. Here are the responses with the number of people who were interested in each item and also what the board has planned to do (if applicable).

Top of the list was trash or litter problems (9).

There will be a committee meeting on Friday, May 10th at 6:30 p.m., 4055 McGee, to discuss resolutions and plans.

Second was crime related problems (7).

Please see Jim Watt for Block Watches and Citizens Crusade Against Crime for legislation you can participate in for affirmative action.

Third was trees - planting, watering, etc. (6).

Jim Watt has been working with Parks and Rec. Dept. During the past few months, many trees have been planted in the neighborhood. It is your responsibility to water these trees weekly or they will die and another will not be planted in the foreseeable future!

Fourth and tied with third was an interest with the upkeep and maintenance of property (6).

The board members are now authorized to give written notice to violators of ordinances. They will follow unheeded notices with a second notice and then notify the proper city department for legal action. This may include putting trash out before pick-up day, loose animals, abandoned cars, parking violations, repair of vehicles on city streets, noise, weeds, codes and zoning violations on houses and apartments, and trash or litter problems.

There were three inquiries concerning zoning which were attended to; two inquires about a vacant building which was discussed at the last general meeting; two inquiries about community planning; and two concerning cultural involvement and/or improvement.

Two people took this opportunity of the the questionnaire to criticize individual people in the neighborhood and one to applaud an individual. Four applauded and one criticized the Association.

The following items were only listed once:

Close an alley (this would take written permission of all homeowners involved and working with the Dept. of Transportation). Wanted information; willing to offer financial assistance; wanted the association to help keep rents down; traffic problem; parking problem; wanted to help with newsletter; noise; problem with Rockhill Manor; wanted another name change; thinks we should hire a staff person and become a professional neighborhood association; would like flower pots near curbs; their complaints were not heeded by the city; codes enforcement; environmental; repair the stone wall around Southmoreland Park and install curbs; animal problem.

Through the questionnaire we were able to identify six people willing to help with the Main Street Parade; thirteen willing to help with fund raising (two who only would help with a garage sale); ten who would help carry the newsletter - this resulted in nine changes last month concerning how the newsletter is carried; twenty-eight people willing to attend hearings with five needing a ride.

Since many problems look to be resolved from the use of this questionnaire, we will look forward to using the questionnaire again next year.



SOUTHMORELAND MEETS NATIONAL STANDARDS

The Southmoreland Neighborhood Historic District (43rd to 44th, Warwick to Rockhill) has just been certified by the Department of the Interior as meeting national register of historic places standards. In addition to public recognition, this designation can provide tax benefits to owners of the fifty homes in the district.

Any building owner who is willing to share his right to determine what changes can be made to the exterior of his building may grant a facade easement to a group such as the Historic Kansas City Foundation. The value of the facade easement can then be deducted as a charitable contribution.

Also, the owner of any rental property may qualify for a 25% investment tax credit for certain rehabilitation work if the cost of the rehab is more than the tax basis of the building.

While most homeowners won't find the tax benefits very helpful, the intangible benefits of being in a recognized historic district can help preserve the area and instill a sense of pride that is shared by the whole neighborhood. Our thanks to Lou Steele and the Kansas City Landmarks Commission for obtaining the certification for us.

UPDATE

The Simpson House - Unitarian Center, 4509 Walnut, is at the completion stage of being available for receptions, meetings, seminars, musical programs, etc.

Jackson County State Bank will be moving into its new facility at One Main Plaza (Linclay development), around August 1st. The facility will offer full banking services (loans, deposits, safe deposit box, etc.). The Bank has also made available lobby space to the Kansas City Art Institute, allowing the Institute and its students to display their work. This is an example of how Jackson County State Bank will be contributing and participating with the Southmoreland Neighborhood.

Fountainview (Property Company of America), 45th & Main. Project Description: Two twin, 15-story, 239,000 sq. st. towers connected by a one-story 7,625 sq. ft. structure. Each tower will have 199,899 sq. ft. of rentable space. Exterior features include functional balconies, polished granite, pre-cast concrete with granite aggregate and bronze reflective glass. An octagon shaped cap will top each building. The two-story lobby will feature granite and marble finishes. Six elevators will serve the tower on a split bank system.

Demolition is completed on existing structures, including Berbiglia Liquors, Cousins Furniture and the adjacent apartment buildings. Phase I, including the north tower and one-story connector building, is out for bid. Construction is anticipated to start in early June with occupancy slatec for the fourth quarter of 1986.

A five-story parking garage will be constructed beneath each tower to provide parking at a ratio of over 3.2 cars per 1,000 sq. ft. of building. Parking will be charged at \$50/space per month. Floor sizes: 5,600 - 17,250 sq. ft. of rentable space. Lease rates: \$22.50 - \$25.65/sq. ft. on a rentable basis.

The Jackson County Office of Division of Family Services is recruiting foster parents.







SEPTEMBER IS MEMBERSHIP MONTH

This month you will be receiving a reminder in the mail with a return envelope for you convenience. (Our thanks for this expense of printing and mailing go to an anonymous donor!) Anyone who lives or works or owns property in the neighborhood is asked to pay a yearly membership. Why? It takes approximately two thousand dollars annually for the newsletter, additional postage and copy work. We do not have any paid staff people we are all volunteers. Our fund raisers help but don't begin to cover all the expenses.

We have been an organized neighborhood since July 11, 1973. Originally, we were called the Gillham-Main Neighborhood, but in 1981 we became incorporated and changed our name to Southmoreland Neighborhood Association and acquired a 501 (C)(3) status. This gained us a not-for-profit designation which means that your contributions are tax deductible. We hope that you bear this in mind when writing your check for membership and perhaps write in a few extra dollars so that we might continue with the work ahead in 1986.

During these past twelve years we have been involved with curbs and sidewalks, planting of trees, deconversion of homes to comply with zoning regulations, resolving code violations, large trash pick-up, historic homes designation (we even had a homes tour in '81), development of residential and commercial, crime prevention and block watches, public and private schools, advancement of arts and culture, collection of food for the needy, and representing our neighborhood on various committees, functions, meetings and events throughout Kansas City.

Senior citizens are asked to pay only one dollar; tenants and students are asked for three dollars; merchants, institutions and developers are asked for twentyfive dollars; and owners are asked for five dollars for each property owned. A "friend of the neighborhood" usually is asked to contribute twenty-five dollars. (A friend is someone outside of the neighborhood.)

There are approximately six thousand resident in this neighborhood. If everyone paid their dues, we wouldn't have to be involved with fund raisers and could get on with the business of the neighborhood.

When you receive your membership letter, please take time to complete the form, mail it to the Treasurer, and give generously to Southmoreland. This is your neighborhood - please care.
